The women who are employed or volunteer at Battered Women's Support Services are on the front-lines of an undeclared war against women; one that is waged in the houses, apartments, single occupancy rooms, and hotel rooms in our cities, our towns, our villages, reservations, and refugee camps all over the world. The undeclared war registers below the radar screen of the 24 hour news networks, the print media or on the local evening news broadcasts, and when reports trickle through, though horrific, the focus is individual and narrow. When we step back we can easily see that violence against women affects us all.

Over half of Canadian women have experienced violence, one in every three women in British Columbia has experienced violence, almost a million women are either assaulted or sexually assaulted in Canada every year, a minimum of one million children in Canada have witnessed violence against their mother by their father or father figure and in Canada almost 90 women are murdered by their partner each year.

The women who work and volunteer at Battered Women's Support Services hear the very worst that one human can do to another human; they know intimately the extent to which violence is inflicted and harm is done. Our staff and volunteers are witnesses for the unspeakable. Our existence is to make public what happens in private.

Currently BWSS employees 24 women and provides volunteer opportunities for 70 women all of whom represent the widest diversity that exists in our communities. We have worked very hard to establish and maintain an organizational culture that ensures everyone is well trained and supported to be the very best at her area of responsibility. It is a dynamic place to work to do the triage work, the service work, the retail *Continues on page 2*


At BWSS, we provide many services and programs for women, but statistics show that youth are vulnerable to abuse in intimate relationships as well. In

fact, one in seven girls in high school have been assaulted by a boyfriend, and 40% of teenage girls report knowing someone their age who has been abused in a dating relationship. Because of these high statistics, we believe that prevention needs to be a huge part of our work in ending violence against women.

We deliver 50-75 minute long Dating Violence presentations to high school youth in Vancouver and the Lower Mainland. The classes are usually mixed

gender, and typically at the grade 10-12 level. The students are engaged and interested, and by the end of our presentation, they are able to identify the different forms of abuse, and that abuse is a systematic pattern based on power and control over another person. Students take an active part in the presentations being

involved in the learning process through brainstorming and small group activities. This gives students an opportunity to share their ideas about what a healthy

Education, we are aware that an even deeper dialog could be possible if this kind of preventative education was more prevalent throughout their entire schooling. We have

received phone calls and emails from girls seeking support after the presentations, so we know that the presentations are making an impact. However, based on the statistics, we also recognize that we are only scratching the surface, and know how critical this work is towards ending violence against women and girls.
