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#### Battered Women's Support Services (BWSS)

We contribute to the freedom and liberation of girls from gender-based violence, and we affect social change through the provision of direct services, training and education programs. We work on systemic advocacy and law reform.

For 40 years, we have been providing crisis intervention, communitybased victim services, counselling, legal advocacy, employment program, and other specialized services to girls and women who experience gender-based violence



We respond to: 10,000 calls a year 200 counselling appointments a month 150 crisis intervention appointments a month 100 legal advocacy appointments a month We held 8 specialized support groups a month 280 women on wait-list



We will explore the social issue of gender-based violence and its impacts on Refugee Women, Refugee claimants, their families and their communities.

# **Spiral of Gender Violence**

- Intersectionality
- Social, economic and political conditions that contribute to gender violence, bound women's reproductive rights and selfdetermination



#### ADULT

family members; Sexual abuse includes marital rape, forced to watch and imitate pornographic acts, extreme sexual neglect or coldness; Economic abuse includes ruined credit, gambling; isolation, permanent or temporary abandonment; Battery during pregnancy; Coerced into criminal activity; Extreme exploitation of household labour; Sexual harassment by employers, other employees, fathers-, brothers-in-laws, clergy, therapists, doctors; Victim-blaming, rejection by community; Forced into unpro-Physical abuse; tected sex, infected with STD's, STI's, Neglect; HIV; Denying mothers access to, Abandonment: custody of children, international Incest; abduction/kidnapping; Intimate Sexual abuse; homicide, femicide, honour killings; Molestation: Withholding adequate food, Abusive clothing, daily necessities, Stalking, "teasing"

#### YOUNG ADULT

cyber-stalking.

Date violence, drug-facilitated rape; Rape, including wartime rape; Denied choice of marriage partner and/or sexual orientation; Dowryrelated deaths; Intimate partner violence; Sexual harassment at work, college

Domestic Violence, Physical abuse by adult Same-sex domestic violence. violence by fathers-, mothers-, abuse; Exploitation of housesisters-, brothers-in-law and natal Coerced suicide pacts or mercy killings.

#### CHILD

Little or no schooling; Child labour; Child prostitution; INFANT Female foeticide; Sex-selected abortion; Infanticide; Mal/undernourishment by withholding nutritious food; Medical care by sibling; withheld. Virgin cleansing.

children, caretakers; Spousal

ELDER

hold labour, child care; Withholding health care, medications, daily necessities; Demeaning widowhood;

TEENAGER Coerced sexual

initiation, rape; Forced marriage to parent's choice, much older man, teen's rapist; Ignorance about sex, anatomy, sexual health; Control over sexuality and sexual orientation; Trafficked; Forced into prostitution; Cyberstalking by boyfriend or unknown predators; Date violence; Harassment, public lewdness; Sexual harassment by extended family, teachers, coaches, peers.

#### **Contributing Factors of Violence Against Women**


- Hierarchy as normal
- Violence as an acceptable way of resolving conflict
- Women are objectified
- Women are taught to submit (especially to men)
- Men are taught to dominate (especially women)




Violence Against Women in Intimate Relationships (Domestic Violence) Definition


- Is a systematic patter of domination
- Where the abuser uses abusive tactics to maintain power and control over the woman
- Where these tactics escalate over time
- Where the woman alters her behavior in an attempt to stop the abuse

























## Self- determination & Safety



#### Self-determination

 Supporting our clients towards strengthening their self-determination so they can empower themselves and seek safety for themselves and their families



- Familiarize yourself with resources for women who have experienced abuse/violence in your area
- Listen to the woman's needs and concerns.
- Gather basic information about her situation
- Do not let "culture" to excuse violence in intimate relationships



- Explore with her what she needs at the moment and provide the appropriate resources
- Respect her confidentiality
- Validate what she has already done to keep herself safe
- Assess and provide a safety plan



- Ensure she understands her rights in Canada
- Ensure she has access to an interpreter who she can understand
- Acknowledge that she may not understand the Canadian legal system even when you have explained it



 Whenever possible make a follow up plan with the woman. Remember that you may be the first person in Canada whom she can trust



#### Meeting women where they are

- Women are the experts of their own experience and their healing journey
- Violence against women is the result of systemic oppression



- Are you currently in an abusive intimate relationship or have you been in an abusive intimate relationship?
  - -Emotional Abuse
  - -Physical Abuse
  - -Financial Abuse
  - -Sexual Abuse
- Do you have any children here or abroad?
- Has anyone, including your partner or your in-laws, physically hurt, threatened, or injured you here or abroad?



- Has anyone, including your partner or your in-laws threatened to hurt you or to hurt someone close to you here or abroad?
- Has anyone, including your partner or your in-laws strangled you or threatened to struggled you?
- Do you feel controlled or isolated by your partner or your in-laws?
- Has anyone, including your partner or in-laws prevented you from having friendships or family relationships here or abroad?



- Have you ever reported to the police that someone has hurt you or that you were a victim of a crime here or abroad?
- Have you ever thought about calling the police for help but were too scared that someone would threaten or hurt you here or abroad?
- Have you ever sought support or accessed social services as a result of someone hurting you here or abroad?



- Has anyone kept your travel or identity documents in his or her possession?
- Has anyone controlled your money?
- Has anyone ever prevented you from seeking medical care here or abroad?
- How have you been coping?
- Substances
- Suicidal Ideation (suicide assessment)
- Self-harm
- Other



### Safety Planning

- Ensure that woman learns about her rights and responsibilities in Canada:
- Criminal Justice System
- Child Protection
- Support Services in her area
- Calling 911
- Believe the women's stories
- Work from trauma informed approach
- Be informed about legal barriers that affect Refugee women
- Be transparent about processes with women and provide all the information she needs



### Safety Planning

- Help women get access to a legal advocate who can help her with her legal issues
- In cases of domestic violence and when her refugee claim is attached to her spouse's, advocate for the police not to contact CBSA or Immigration, until woman has consulted with a lawyer
- Support her in finding a safe space
- Beware of sharing confidential information with her partner. It could place
  the woman at risk
